JMEC Outage Management

Whatever the cause, JMEC's team of linemen and dispatchers are on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week, committed and ready to respond to an outage. The cooperative keeps two full-time vegetation management crews and a coordinator scheduled daily to maintain tree and bush growth along our more than 4,000 miles of line. Recently, the Board of Trustees authorized the issuance of a request for proposals for the installation of new transmission poles to replace those identified in the last inspection which had reached the end of their useful service.

What to do when you experience an outage?

Report it!

• Use the online customer portal, https://billing.jemezcoop.org/oscp/ and click on the outage tab.

Use the JMEC mobile app.

Stay up-to-date on an outage:

 Make sure we have your correct phone number on your account. You will receive updates during extended outages and advance notice of planned outages.

You can be notified by email or text if there is an outage and when it is restored at your home or business.

• Watch the real-time updates on our outage map in the mobile app or on our website with outage location, number of members affected, estimated time for restoration and much more.

We're Making Progress on Helping Resolve Members' Past Due Accounts

Two-day disconnect notices have taken effect. With JMEC's added 30 day grace period in addition to the New Mexico Public Regulatory Commission prohibition on disconnections that expired May 4, the cooperative was able to assist more of its members to resolve past due accounts and stay connected.

Hundreds of members were able to bring their accounts current, set up an installment payment agreement, or have been connected to organizations that were able to offer financial assistance in paying down past due account charges.

For those members who have received a hand-delivered, two-day notice of disconnection or notice was left at your residence if no one was at home, there is time before the 48-hour period expires to contact JMEC customer service representatives to bring their account current or arrange an installment payment agreement.

If you are disconnected and contact JMEC for reconnection, you will be required to pay half (50 percent) or more of what is past due and may put the balance on contract. Should you have extenuating circumstances and believe you need to initiate reconnection after hours, you may call dispatch at 877-753-0095. Please leave a voicemail as this is an automated system and our dispatchers will promptly follow up and respond accordingly.

Throughout the pandemic and as we are returning to routine operations, JMEC has and will continue to extend similar considerations to small commercial members, please contact your local JMEC Office.

Electric Vehicles: The Charging Challenge

All electric vehicles come with a 110-volt charge cord for home use. The charge rate is low, 2 to 5 miles of charge per hour. However, if you have a garage you can install a Level Two 240 volt charger, which will give you 15 to 25 miles of charge per hour. Currently they cost \$300 and up plus installation, typically another \$1000 unless you already have a 240 volt circuit in your garage. Essentially, this gives you a "gas station" at home and in some cases at work. But, Level Two chargers at home are not necessary if you can live with the slower charging rate of the 110 volt charger your car comes with.

If you buy a Tesla, you will have access to some 1000 DC Fast Chargers nationwide, including stations in Albuquerque and Santa Fe, with eight chargers each, which will give you up to 500 miles of charge in an hour, which is to say that you can obtain a useful charge of 150 to 200 miles within 30 to 40 minutes. Other firms are establishing national networks of DC Fast Chargers for other brands of vehicles. If for some reason you can't charge at home overnight, the case with many apartment residents, you can charge at public chargers located in most cities. Jemez Mountains Electric Cooperative is participating in a working group planning the location and financing of chargers in Northern New Mexico.
